training will boost preparation and department readiness.

Throughout the months of September and October, the Bath Township Fire Department has been training at a structure on Herbison Road, near Hunter Road. The house was scheduled for demolition and the owner, Brett Whitmore, allowed our firefighters to train there. The training was coordinated with the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality to ensure environmental protection, as well as for the safety of the residents living in the area.

Most recent training has included:

- Rescuing a trapped firefighter, including complex rescue scenarios and moving people from inside a structure to outdoors.
- Advanced fire attack techniques.
- Cutting ventilation holes in the roof.
- Dragging hose in through a house.
- Hidden fire detection by tearing down plaster and lathe.
- Breathing apparatus practice.
- Conducting a controlled burn.
- Saving pet lives using Servpro oxygen masks.
- Continuing Medical Education (CME) as part of a collaborative agreement with Clinton Area EMS.
- Patient treatment protocols.
- All-terrain vehicle operation.
- Emergency medical care of sick and injured persons.

The Fire Department is also moving forward on modernizing its training operation. The Township Board of Trustees recently





approved an online learning system for the Fire Department. This state of the art system will track, record, and facilitate much of the legally mandated regulatory, fire, leadership, personnel, and medical training. This system will also help the Department with its Insurance Service Office (ISO) evaluation in 2016.

This is the question our Township Board of Trustees has been considering as it works on producing a brand new strategic framework plan to guide activities and investments in the Bath community.




The four goals of the draft Strategic Plan follow:

- 4. Deliver superior services and maintain the Township's financial health.



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

Capital Area Community Foundation Awards Senior Center with \$55,000 Grant for Upgrades

The Bath Township Senior Center will receive a significant upgrade thanks to a \$55,000 grant from the Capital Region Community Foundation.

The grant, which must be matched with Township funds, will be used for the second phase of an upgrade to the Senior Center's kitchen. The upgrades will include installing a commercial oven and hood, dishwasher, water heater and refrigerator and enlarging the kitchen space.

The Center's restrooms will also be upgraded to meet the Americans with Disabilities Act requirements as part of the improvements.

Hildebrant said the CRCF grant will enable them to better serve a growing population. "We've had to turn people away because we ran out of prepared food," she said. "With this renovation, our dream is to feed everyone who comes through our doors. This arant is the difference between seniors going hungry and having a place to gather for socialization and healthy meals."

The first phase of the kitchen upgrade included installing a commercial sink with three basins and a hot food serving counter, as well as painting walls and ceilings.

The senior center is located at 14480

Three days a week, the center serves nutritionally sound, home-cooked meals that consist of locally grown, fresh ingredients to seniors from Bath and the surrounding communities – all for just \$3 per person. Demand for the meals has grown steadily since 2012, and the center's current, tiny kitchen can't keep up. Imagine trying to prepare a Thanksgiving meal for 60-80 people in your home three days a week.

"The new kitchen means we won't have to cook in phases," said Karen Hildebrant, who handles administrative services for Bath Charter Township. "We won't be taking pans of au gratin potatoes over to the police department to use their oven so they'll be ready in time for lunch." Webster Road, behind the Bath Township offices. The Center is open Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 am - 3 pm. A variety of activities are also offered throughout the week. State Grant Assists Township with Inspection & Cleaning of Sewers

Bath Township has received a Storm and Waste Water (SAW) grant from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality to assess sanitary sewer conditions and to develop an asset management plan. Assessing conditions of the sewer system will include evaluating manholes and cleaning and televising sewer mains which are older than 20 years old and haven't been televised in the last 10 years.

The cleaning and televising

activities were let out for bids late this summer, and Advanced Rehabilitation Technology out of Bryan, Ohio, was awarded the contract. They are scheduled to start the week of October 12 and be completed by the holidays. Residents will be notified when the contractor will be working in their neighborhood.

Reason for cleaning and inspecting the sewers

The cleaning and inspection program keeps the sewer system operating efficiently by:

- helping prevent blockages and backups
- removing built-up debris, such as tree roots, grease, grit and sand
- determining the condition of the sewer so we can repair or replace sewers as necessary

How sewers are cleaned

We use a high-pressure nozzle to flush water down the sewer. The dirt and debris are sucked up through a manhole by a large vacuum truck and taken to the landfill.

How sewer are inspected

We insert a remotely operated video camera into the sewer to record its condition. From the video we can tell if we need to repair or replace the sewer.

Estimate time of cleaning/inspecting

Project will begin in October and be completed by the Holidays. It usually takes about one day to clean the sewer on each block. However, some sewers can take longer, depending on their size and condition.

Items completed by the homeowner before sewer cleaning will begin on your street

Occasionally during cleaning and inspection, air pressure in the sewer can cause water to splash out through toilets, sinks and drains. Take the following precautions to prevent water damage in your home:

- Close the lids on all toilet bowls when not in use.
- Insert drain plugs in all sinks and bathtubs when not in use.
- Remove all floor mats in bathrooms.
- Place an old towel around the base of toilets.
- Wrap the cover of your basement floor drains with thick plastic, and place something heavy over it.

If you are running a faucet in your house to keep the lines from freezing, run water from a tap at the highest elevation in the house (i.e. main floor or upper level, not basement)

Bath Farmers Market Awarded Grant by United States Department of Agriculture

The US Department of Agriculture awarded a \$58,534 grant to Bath Township under the Farmers Market Promotion Program for October 2015 through September 2017.

The Bath Farmers Market "Successful Vendors Make a Successful Market" project will use multiple strategies to increase customer attendance and sales. Dan Stockwell, chairperson of the



Bath Farmers Market Board, said, "We will be offering seminars on marketing for small agriculture and artisan businesses, promotion of Bath Farmers Market and our vendors, and providing hands-on cooking and nutrition instruction."

The vendor training will be a series of workshops taught by a marketing professional on topics such as social media, direct mail and print advertising, video, branding, and mobile websites. The training will be customized to meet the needs of small-scale vendors using outlets such as farmers markets and local retail outlets. The vendor training will improve marketing capabilities of vendors to benefit their own businesses, in turn successfully impacting the Market overall.

The grant will also be used to develop a marketing strategy specifically for the Bath Farmers Market and will support digital and print advertising of the Market. The marketing strategy will emphasize targeted advertising to populations currently underserved by the Farmers Market.

The third strategy of the Bath Farmers Market will be building on the success of its current "Guest Chef" cooking demonstrations featuring ingredients purchased at the Market; these demonstrations will be expanded to once per month on a year-round basis. The demonstrations are fun and informative, and they serve to attract customers and increase consumption of local foods.

"Teaching Kids to Cook" demonstrations will be a learning experience for children in grades 6 through 8. The children will help select and purchase ingredients at the Bath Farmers Market. Under the guidance of a trained chef they will then learn nutritional awareness, safe food handling, and basic culinary skills. The program will be repeated during different seasons when different ingredients are in harvest.

Seniors – Let MiCAFE Help with Resources for Food, Medicine, Rent or Utility Bills!

If you or someone you know in Bath Township is 60 or older and living on a limited income, the MiCAFE (Michigan's Coordinated Access to Food for the Elderly) Program may be able to help with resources for food, medicine, rent or utility bills. Walk-in appointments are available the second Thursday of each month, 9 am – 12 pm, at the Bath Township Library Center, 14033 Webster Road. It is recommended that you contact our local volunteers by calling (517) 749-3333 with questions or to make an appointment.

Our trained and caring volunteers, Theresa, Linda, and Paula can assist in the completion and processing of applications for the Bridge Card (food assistance), Medicare Savings (help with paying Part B premiums), Medicaid, utility assistance, and in-home services. Help with choosing a Medicare Supplemental Plan is also available.



MiCAFE is a program sponsored by Elder Law of Michigan. Elder Law offers many other services that include help with mortgage/ foreclosure prevention, reverse mortgage counseling, landlord and tenant issues, Section 8 vouchers, public housing, utility company problems, transition housing, relocation, land contracts, homelessness and fair housing issues. Food Programs Available for Low-Income Households

Bath Township is partnering with Capital Area Community Services (CACS) to provide a supplemental food program for low-income households. In addition to helping identify and qualify those in need, the Township will also be a pick-up site for the distribution of food.

There are two different programs to assist people living in Ingham, Eaton, Clinton and Shiawassee Counties.

Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)

CSFP food packages are distributed monthly to supplement the nutritional needs of lowincome pregnant and breast feeding women, new mothers up to one year postpartum, infants, children up to their sixth birthday and those persons at least 60 years of age who meet income eligibility requirements. Food packages have a retail value of approximately \$50. Ninety-four percent (94%) of the packages distributed go to low income seniors. In addition to distributing food, the CACS program offers food preparation demonstrations, recipe suggestions, and nutritional information to assist program recipients to make healthy dietary choices.

The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)

TEFAP is a quarterly food assistance program that provides commodities to low-income households

four times per year. Although food packages vary, each package includes protein, fruit and vegetables. Items from each food group are made available four times per year to assist recipients in maintaining a healthy diet.

Tri-County Bicycle Association Awards Township with Grant for Bicycle Racks

The Tri-County Bicycle Association awarded a \$3,000 grant to Bath Township to install eight bicycle racks around town.

Bath Township used the grant to purchase eight hoop-style bike racks. The Township is providing the materials and labor for installation of the racks, as well as ongoing maintenance. Township Superintendent Dan Wietecha said, "It's a nice little partnership that we can work together with Tri-County Bicycle Association providing the bike racks and the Township installing them."

The bike racks are currently being installed at the Township Offices, Fletcher-Robson Nature Area, Couzens Park, Library Center, Wiswasser Park, Park Lake Beach, Township Soccer Park, and the Bath Community Center. "These locations provide 'close to home' destinations, as well as connections to the regional on-street and trailway network," said Wietecha. The Township worked with TCBA for advice in placing the racks at each site.

Established in 1975, the DALMAC Fund has granted over \$1 million to a variety of bicycling activities in Michigan ranging from safety

and education programs to bicycle trail development. This year the DALMAC Fund and Tri-County Bicycle Association awarded nineteen grants totaling \$88,000 to projects across Michigan.

The Trustees discussed the survey results at their work session on October 5th, prior to the regularly scheduled Board meeting. These survey results, including graphic presentation that compiles all of the responses gathered during the survey window, along with thoughtful analysis of the results is available on the Township's website, www.bathtownship.us.

We hope that you will continue to stay tuned to this process, as your constructive critiques will shape the final product that will guide us for years in the future.

without inserting the drain plug.

What to expect after the sewers are cleaned/inspected

Sometimes the sewer cleaning and inspection leaves an odor in the home. If so, run some water down the sink and bathtub drains, flush the toilets, pour a pail of water into each basement floor drain, and open the windows. After a short time, the odor should disappear.

Use of facilities while sewers are cleaned/ inspected

Be careful as air pressure in the sewer during the cleaning and inspection can sometimes cause water to splash out through toilets, sinks and drains. Remember to close the lids on all toilet bowls when not in use, and insert drain plugs in all sinks and bathtubs when not in use.

"This is super exciting," said Township Superintendent Dan Wietecha. "Other farmers markets are not doing the vendor training or the 'Teaching Kids to Cook' demonstrations. These innovative projects will help the Bath Farmers Market and serve as an example which can be replicated to benefit other markets in the future."

The Bath Farmers Market is held every Thursday afternoon year-round. From May through October, the "summer" Market is located outdoors in the centrally located Couzens Park. From November through April, the "winter" Market is located indoors at the Bath Community Center. The Market's mission is to promote healthy lifestyles, encourage entrepreneurship, support the local economy, and provide opportunities for farmers and artisans.

Under the 2014 Farm Bill, the USDA Agricultural Marketing Service is awarding \$13.3 million in Farmers Market Promotion Program grants to 164 marketing and promotion projects (including 8 in Michigan) involved with farmers markets, community supported agriculture, and other direct-to-consumer outlets for local food.
