Keeping the Township Orderly & Neat

Maintaining healthful surroundings for life in agricultural, residential and non-residential areas is attainable through the efforts of the entire community.

If you have any of the following located on your property outside of a completely enclosed building, you could potentially be in violation of Bath Charter Township's Code of Ordinances:

Trash & Rubbish:

Any and all forms of debris not otherwise classified.

Junk:

Includes parts of machinery or motor vehicles, broken and unusable furniture, stoves, refrigerators and other appliances, remnants of wood, metal or any other cast off material of any kind, whether or not the material could be put to any reasonable use.

Junk Vehicles:

Any wrecked or dismantled vehicle, including, but not limited to, cars, trucks, tractor trucks and trailers, utility trailers, mobile homes, recreational vehicles (motorcycles, boats, travel trailers, motor homes, campers, all-terrain vehicles, snowmobiles and trailers), and other similar vehicles which are not licensed for use upon highways of the State and shall also include, whether licensed or not, any vehicle which is inoperable or does not have all of its main component parts attached.

Building Materials:

Includes lumber, bricks, concrete or cinder blocks, plumbing materials, electrical wiring or equipment, heating ducts, equipment, shingles, mortar, concrete or cement, nails, screws or any other materials used in constructing any structure.

Dispose of household items – including furniture, electronics and appliances – at the Township during the Annual Tom King Memorial Junk Day.

This is a free program to Bath Charter Township residents. Space is limited and registration is required to participate. There is a two-load limit per address – a truck or trailer load equates to one load.

If authorized items are mixed with unauthorized items in your load, our crews are not obligated to sort the materials and may refuse the entire load.

Curbside Service for Residents 60+ and/or Disabled

The Township will also provide a curbside-only service for citizens age 60+, or individuals who are physically disabled and can't bring their materials to the drop-off site.

Qualified persons may call the Township Offices at (517) 641-6728 beginning on April 25 to schedule a pick-up appointment for the week of May 9.

Curbside Service for Residents 60+ and/or Disabled

- Items must be placed curbside by 8:00 a.m.
 on the day of your scheduled pick up.
- Crews WILL NOT enter your property to collect items.
- If you need help placing items curbside, there may be assistance available through Unity in the Community, a Bath High School program.
- If authorized items placed for collection are mixed with unauthorized items, our crews are not obligated to sort the materials and may refuse the entire load.

Items that are NOT accepted:

- Asbestos (including ceiling/floor tiles and insulation)
- Compressed Gas Cylinders
- Dangerous Items (such as lumber with nails sticking out)
- Demolition Materials (including concrete, brick, block, shingles and other roofing materials)
- Large Wood Pieces
- Drums/Barrels that are Not Empty/Clean
- Hazardous Waste (or any container with a hazardous waste label)
- Household Refuse
- Lead Acid Batteries
- Liquids
- Medical Waste (including Sharps Materials)
- Non-Household Liquid Waste
- · Paint Cans that are Not Dry
- Polychlorinated Biphenyls (such as fluorescent light ballasts and other materials containing PCBs)
- Radioactive Waste
- Sewage
- Tires on Rims
- Toxic Materials (Anything ignitable, corrosive or reactive)
- Yard Clippings

Additional Requirements:

- Lumber must be cut to four-foot lengths
- Up to 10; Tires MUST be off rims, free of dirt and water
- Large pieces of glass should be broken into a pail
- NO tractor tires allowed unless you have prearranged for an additional fee

MiCAFE in Bath Township

Election Inspectors Needed!

Bath Township is in need of election inspectors – workers (paid) to assist voters at the polls on Election Day. Registered voters who are interested in serving as election inspectors must submit an Election Inspector Application to Bath Charter Township.

Election inspectors cannot be a challenger, candidate, member of a candidate's immediate family, or a member of the local Board of Canvassers. Anyone convicted of a felony or an election crime may not serve. Election inspectors are covered by the federal Minimum Wage Act. Election inspector training is provided.

Connecting Community at the Bath Farmers Market

The Bath Farmers Market runs all year round and offers seasonal local produce, eggs, honey, baked goods, and prepared foods. From November through April, the Market is located in the Bath Community Center (5959 Park Lake Road), and from May through October, it is located in James Couzens Park (13751 Main Street). The Market is open every Thursday from 3:00-7:00 p.m.

The Farmers Market is a great place to connect with friends, neighbors, and local farmers and business owners. The Market features live folk music every week that sets a wonderful mood for community building. Right now at the market you will find homemade spice mixes, maple syrup, jams/jellies, winter squash, dry beans, pierogi, brats, cabbage rolls and a wide variety of baked goods (including Gluten Free) like bagels, cookies, scones, Czech baked goods, and more! Also, there are delicious prepared foods by Alicia's Authentic Mexican Deli & Catering, and BBQ from Red's Smokehouse.

Tables are available so you can bring friends or family and grab some dinner and enjoy the ambiance.
