Lift Station 203 Sanitary Sewer Construction Project on Drumheller Road

Lift Station 203 on Drumheller Road was built in 1974 and is now in extremely deteriorated condition and at risk of failure. Over half of the Township's sewage flows through this essential piece of sewer system.

The LS 203 project was put out for competitive bids to replace the lift station and 3,200 feet of sanitary sewer between I-69 and Webster Road.

Due to challenging soil conditions and groundwater, the sewer construction along Drumheller was very slow. From late July to early September, contractor Kamminga & Roodvoets (K&R) first "mucked out" the bad soils, backfilled the trench with sand, then backtracked to install the new pipe within the sand trench.



In early September, K&R turned the corner to start installing new pipe southward toward I-69 to connect with last winter's cured in-place pipelining (CIPP) project. Completion is anticipated this fall.

Proper Disposal of FATS, OILS & GREASES

Fats don't dissolve in water. The result of washing FATS, OILS, and GREASES (FOG) down your drains



can be **disastrous** — causing backups in your home or your neighbor's home with extensive and unpleasant damage.

> Don't put liquid oil in the trash.

Instead, place it in a sealed can and add kitty litter, coffee grounds or other absorbent material.
